Somewhere to Settle – What is special about the North East?

Autumn 2: Year 4



<u>Maths</u>

Addition and Subtraction using 4-digit numbers.

Adding and subtracting using no exchanges, using one or more exchanges, efficient subtraction, estimation and checking strategies.

Measurements: Length & perimeters.

Measuring in millimetres, centimetres, metres & kilometres. Adding and subtracting lengths. Measuring perimeters. Perimeters on a grid, rectangles, and rectilinear shapes.

Multiplication and division.

Multiplying and dividing by 10/100. Multiplying by 1 & 0. Dividing by 1 and itself. Multiplying by 6,7, & 9.

Homework will be given to support the key skills being taught in school, there will be a strong focus on times table knowledge. Appropriate apps and website games include School 360 and Times Table Rock stars

<u>RE</u>

Incarnation: What is the Trinity?

We will identify John 1 as part of a 'Gospel', noting some differences between John and the other Gospels. We will offer suggestions for what texts about God might mean. We will be able to describe how Christians show their beliefs about God the Trinity in the way they live. We will make links between some of the texts and teachings about God in the Bible and what people believe about God in the world today, expressing some ideas of their own clearly.

Key Skills

- Make links between some of the stories and teachings in the Bible and life in the world today, expressing some ideas of their own clearly.
- Describe how Christians show their beliefs in worship and in the way they live.

Science

<u>Sound</u>

The children will learn about how vibrations cause sounds and how sounds travel and how sounds can change pitch and loudness. How sounds are made by completing a sound survey of our school. Create a human model of the way particles pass sound vibrations on. Explore pitch and how high and low sounds are made. Investigate how sounds change over distance and through materials.

Key Skills

Working scientifically

 making systematic and careful observations and, where appropriate, taking accurate measurements using standard units, using a range of equipment, including thermometers and data loggers

Key objectives

- identify how sounds are made, associating some of them with something vibrating
- recognise that vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear

Geography

Somewhere to Settle – What is special about the North East?

In this unit, children head back in time to find out how the towns and cities of the UK first developed. Children will learn about the needs and requirements early settlers had when choosing a place to build a home. They will look at areas around the UK, in particular the North East to see how the Anglo-Saxons, Romans and Vikings all left their mark.

Key Skills

- use maps, atlases, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features studied
- use the 8 points of a compass, 4- and 6-figure grid references
- use fieldwork to observe, measure record and present the human and physical features in the local area using a range of methods, including sketch maps, plans and graphs, and digital technologies

Art and Design

Key artist: Ayme Fitzgerald

Printmaking:

- Roller printing.
- Use of simple block shapes created by the children.
- Continue to explore blending colours

<u>Key Skills</u>

- Learn about artists and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms.
- Plan creative work exploring my ideas and record my experiences.
- Improve my art and design techniques, including painting with a range of materials [for example, acrylic paint, watercolour].
- Produce creative work exploring my ideas and recording my experiences.
- Evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art, craft, and design.

<u>P.E.</u>

Tuesday's session will be delivered by Mr Thompson and will mainly take place outdoors. Please ensure your child's PE kit is appropriate for this including warm tracksuit bottoms. No jewellery should be worn in school.

We will play Tag Rugby, modified where appropriate, and apply basic principles suitable for attacking and defending in invasion games. We will also have an inhouse competition. We will continue to set our own personal goals. We will make comparisons and demonstrate how we have improved to achieve our personal targets.

Computing

This half term the children will create their own blog detailing what they have learnt from research that they will complete throughout their Computing sessions. The children will learn about different technologies both old and new, about inventors and the different components of a computer.

Music

Music plays a big part in our classroom. The children often ask for different pieces of music to be played during handwriting at different parts the day. Through this, we are working on showing our appreciation for a range of genres and understanding of how different pieces of music can affect our emotions.

We will continue to study the Fresh Prince of Bel-Air in our Charanga unit this term.

We will also be beginning to learn and prepare for our end of term Christmas production.

<u>French</u>

The children will learn how to remember the nouns for family members in French from memory, describe our own or a fictitious family in French by name, age and relationship and count up to 100 in French.
